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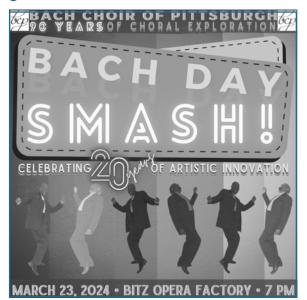

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Program Notes by Choir Member Paul Tellers



Considering Matthew Shepard is a musical response to the murder of Matthew Shepard. On October 6, 1998, University of Wyoming student Matthew Shepard was kidnapped, beaten, and left to die, in what became an infamous act of brutality, and one of America's most notorious anti-gay hate crimes.

In 2016 composer Craig Hella Johnson responded with Considering Matthew Shepard, his first concert-length work. This three-part oratorio incorporates a variety of musical styles seamlessly woven into a unified whole. Johnson sets a wide range of poetic and soulful texts by poets including Hildegard of Bingen, Lesléa Newman, Michael Dennis Browne, and Rumi. Passages from Matt's personal journal, interviews and writings from his parents Judy and Dennis Shepard, newspaper reports, and additional texts by Johnson and Browne appear throughout the work.

The work combines a variety of musical styles, from country and gospel to chant and oratorio, to create a powerful and moving experience for audiences.

"The piece actually became a whole lot more than just the story of the suffering," Johnson said. "It needed to become this larger invitation to return to love. And to return to remember who we are as human beings, in the deepest sense of our essence."

"Introduction" from October Mourning: A Song for Matthew Shepard, by Lesléa Newman

On Tuesday, October 6, 1998, at approximately 11:45 p.m., twenty-oneyear-old Matthew Shepard, a gay college student attending the University of Wyoming, was kidnapped from a bar by twenty-one-year old Aaron McKinney and twenty-one-year-old Russell Henderson. Pretending to be gay, the two men lured Matthew Shepard into their truck, drove him to the outskirts of Laramie, robbed him, beat him with a pistol, tied him to a buckrail fence, and left him to die. The next day, at about 6:00 p.m. – eighteen hours after the attack – he was discovered and taken to a hospital. He never regained consciousness and died five days later, on Monday, October 12, with his family by his side.

One of the last things Matthew Shepard did that Tuesday night was attend a meeting of the University of Wyoming's Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, and Transgendered Association. The group was putting final touches on plans for Gay Awareness Week, scheduled to begin the following Sunday, October 11, coinciding with a National Coming Out Day. Planned campus activities included a film showing, an open poetry reading, and a keynote speaker.

That keynote speaker was me.

I never forgot what happened in Laramie, and around the tenth anniversary of Matthew Shepard's death, I found myself thinking more and more about him. And so I began writing a series of poems, striving to create a work of art that explores the events surrounding Matthew Shepard's murder in order to gain a better understanding of their impact on myself and the world. What really happened at the fence that night? Only three people know the answer to that question. Two of them are imprisoned, convicted murderers whose stories often contradict each other (for example, in separate interviews both McKinney and Henderson have claimed that he alone tied Matthew Shepard to the fence). The other person who knows what really happened that night is dead. We will never know his side of the story. This book is my side of the story.

While the poems in this book are inspired by actual events, they do not in any way represent the statements, thoughts, feelings, opinions, or attitudes of any actual person. The statements, thoughts, feelings, opinions, and attitudes conveyed belong to me. All monologues contained within the poems are figments of my imagination; no actual person spoke any of the words contained within the body of any poem. Those words are mine and mine alone. When the words of an actual person are used as a short epigraph for a poem, the source of that quote is cited at the back of the book in a section entitled "Notes," which contains citations and suggestions for further reading about the crime. The poems, which are meant to be read in sequential order as one whole work, are a work of poetic invention and imagination: a historical novel in verse. The poems are not an objective reporting of Matthew Shepard's murder and its aftermath; rather they are my own personal interpretation of them.

There is a bench on the campus of the University of Wyoming dedicated to Matthew Shepard, inscribed with the words He continues to make a difference. My hope is that readers of October Mourning: A Song for Matthew Shepard will be inspired to make a difference and honor his legacy by erasing hate and replacing it with compassion, understanding, and love.

Reflections on **Considering Matthew Shepard,** by Choir Member **Anna-Noel Bass-Riley**

When Matthew Shepard died in a hospital in Colorado, he was two months shy of his 22nd birthday. As a queer young adult myself - I'll be turning 23 in about a month - singing about a queer youth being murdered for his queerness is a sobering experience. Hearing the story is one thing, but spending a good portion of my time focusing on it is another. It makes me question how much has changed. Could I be the next person killed for whom she loves?

Possibly. In 2021, hate crimes targeting sexual orientation were the second most common hate crime after those of race, according to the Department of Justice, and there was a 13.8% increase in hate crimes against people because of their sexuality from 2021 to 2022. There was a 32.9% rise in hate crimes targeting people for their gender identity, and many laws have been passed that are specifically aimed against those who don't identify within the gender binary. Things may have gotten better, but they're certainly not perfect.

But Considering Matthew Shepard isn't just about the murder of a gay man. It's also about the aftermath, the response by the public. It's about the righteous anger against the killing of an innocent young man and the outpouring of love towards Matthew's friends and family. And that is what I would like you to take away from this composition.

In this time of division, both social and political, love and compassion is something that is desperately needed. Towards friends, towards family, and even towards your enemies. That is what I'd like you to walk away from this performance thinking about.

I hope you enjoy listening to Considering Matthew Shepard as much as I enjoy performing it, and thank you for coming to our performance.





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THOMAS W. DOUGLAS Artistic

Director, is a compelling and passionate conductor having performed more than 250 opera, oratorio, orchestral and musical theater productions. As the Artistic Director of the Bach Choir of Pittsburgh he regularly receives accolades for innovative, creative and dramatically provocative productions. He was also the music director of the Newton Symphony in Kansas. Career highlights include conducting Webber's

Phantom of the Opera in Basel, Switzerland, Gershwin's Porgy and Bess, the Pittsburgh premiere of the classic silent films *The Passion of Joan of Arc*, with live orchestra and chorus, the U.S. premiere of David Chesky's *The Agnostic*, the rousing *Carmina Burana Africana*, Mozart's *Die Zauberflöte* and *Don Giovanni* and a production of *Ain't Misbehavin'* in Malaysia.

Douglas works regularly as Musical Director at Music Theater Wichita where he has done many productions including *Smokey Joe's Café, The Little Mermaid, Ragtime, Hairspray, The Full Monty, Miss Saigon, Beauty and the Beast* and *Les Misérables* among many others. He has also conducted the Anchorage Opera, San Diego Symphony, Seattle Symphony, Des Moines Symphony, Pittsburgh Symphony, at the City Theater, Pittsburgh Festival Opera, Canton Symphony, Wichita Symphony, Dallas Symphony and the River City Brass Band. In addition, Douglas has conducted classical guitarist and Latin Grammy winner Berta Rojas, Tony winner Kelli O'Hara, and Leslie Odom Jr., Tony winner for his role in *Hamilton*.

Thomas has enjoyed the stage roles of Amonasro in Elton John's Aida, Caiaphas in Jesus Christ Superstar and Balthazar in Amahl and the Night Visitors. He has been a vocal soloist with the River City Brass, Pittsburgh Opera, Pittsburgh Symphony, Canton Symphony, the Children's Festival Chorus and sings frequently with jazz legend Joe Negri in his Mass of Hope. Douglas is the Director of Opera Studies and also Choral Activities at Carnegie Mellon University. This is his 19th season with the Bach Choir of Pittsburgh.

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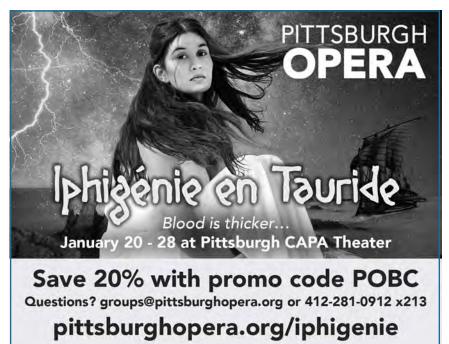
